## What does it mean that the EFC now has a Resident Theologian?

#### David Guretzki introduces himself and his work

've always been impressed by the way The Evangelical Fellowship of Canada (EFC) has been able to bring biblical and theological perspectives to issues at hand.

This attention has allowed the EFC to speak in such a way that it both represents, and at times, leads Evangelicals on the issues facing us today.

This is the first time the EFC has employed a resident theologian, so the specific tasks I'll be doing will emerge in the weeks and months to come. However, I will be doing three basic kinds of work:


### **Ensuring Theological Consistency and Coherence**

Most importantly, my job will be to help us be sure we are being faithful to the teachings of the Bible and our own doctrinal statement. But the EFC is also a fellowship of denominations, schools and ministry organizations which have self-identified as evangelical. This means that we need to be sensitive to the currents and conversations they are having so that we can speak with consistency and coherence with them as well.

I'll be thinking of ways to better equip our staff to engage, speak, write and represent us with biblical and theological integrity – and again in a way that is theologically consistent with our affiliates and members. The big but exciting challenge for me will be to find ways of listening well to our affiliates and understanding the issues they are facing.

#### **Theological Facilitation and Teaching**

I am deeply committed to the principle that theology is the task of the



whole Church, and not just individual theologians. A good theologian is not one who works in isolation from practising Christian communities (the old "ivory tower" image) but one who works together with and on behalf of confessing Christian communities.

Because the EFC is a fellowship of Evangelicals, I see part of my role as facilitating conversation between Church and organizational leaders to come to common conclusions where possible. I will also be available to serve our affiliate churches and organizations to speak and teach on theological issues they are facing.

I welcome churches and leaders to contact me about coming to spend

time with them consulting, speaking or teaching. I have considerable experience working with pastors and church leaders in their own context to teach either them or their congregations on a topic they've requested.

I may or may not have expertise already in the issue, but I do have the training and gifting to come up to speed quickly on the issues. My hope is that I can help Christians understand the main biblical and theological issues they need to grapple with in their own ministries and communities.

Of course, I'm also available to brief churches and organizations on some of the major issues the EFC is working on, whether that be an Ottawa legal or political issue, or a theological or ethical issue churches are facing.

#### Ongoing Theological Research and Writing

I'm grateful that Bruce Clemenger is a scholar himself and therefore understands that speaking and writing with theological and philosophical veracity requires time to read, reflect and research on matters that may not always appear to be immediately relevant to issues at hand.

Thoughtful and faithful theological response needs time for spiritual and intellectual percolation and prayer. Here the President has mandated that at least part of my time as resident theologian includes trying to "keep up" with and contribute to broader theological scholarship.

There will also be limited opportunities to for me to teach in some of our affiliate seminaries upon invitation and as time permits.

Of course, I will also be writing articles, documents and briefings on projects the EFC is working on. You can expect to see me contribute articles in our publications such as Faith Today and Canada Watch, or in the various resources we are constantly developing.

My hope and prayer is that all I do will be a resource to our affiliate pastors, leaders and congregants.



## Youth research project will answer important questions about kids and faith

The EFC, along with its partners Power to Change, Youth For Christ, Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship, Truth Matters Ministries and The Leadership studio, is engaging in a long-awaited new youth and young adult study.

he new study explores one of the key findings of Hemorrhaging Faith, the 2012 research on why and when young people leave the Christian faith. That research revealed that life transition times are key moments when youth leave the Church or disengage from their faith.

"There were about four types of transitions that were significant," says Sid Koop, chair of the Young Adult Transition Research project. Transition towards autonomy, transition of leadership, transition into another community and finally, transition from one program to another, including from high school to post-secondary realities.

"A significant portion of kids who disengage from the Church and their faith do so during that particular transition,"

says Koop. "This research will help us understand why this happens and what can be done about it. What do we need" to do pre-transition, mid-transition and post-transition to help them make that movement in a spiritually healthy way?"

Research like this, Koop explains, creates accountability. "It forces us to come face to face and acknowledge the current reality, and then by God's grace it should move us to become very intentional in pursuing a new reality, a new God-glorifying Kingdom reality."

Koop and his team are more convinced than ever of the importance of research like this in the Canadian context. "Not because it necessarily gives the experts new information - most of us in the field intuitively have an idea of what is taking place. But this brings clarity to the reality and demands a right response," says Koop.

"The research provides clarity for intentional, strategic response, and it demands accountability to the reality that is clearly seen. We need it."






## Message from the President, Bruce J. Clemenger

## Updating you on Canada's most immediate issues

- Pornography: The EFC is asking the federal health minister to initiate further study on the public health impact of pornography and to take steps to protect children from accessing violent pornography online. A sample letter is posted at www.TheEFC.ca/Pornography.
- Religious Discrimination: The Canadian Heritage Committee is expected to begin its study this fall of systemic racism and religious discrimination. The EFC has asked to appear before the committee and is preparing a written submission.
- Prostitution: The EFC plans to make a submission to the Minister of Justice asking her to uphold the prostitution laws. The House of Commons Justice Committee has passed a motion to study human trafficking in Canada. The EFC will look to engage in this study.
- Palliative Care: Bill C-277, a private member's bill on palliative care which the EFC supports, has passed the House of Commons and is now in the Senate. This bill brings much-needed attention to palliative care, including the need for data collection and

identifying education and training needs. For updates see www.TheEFC.ca/C277.

The EFC is developing a new toolkit to help churches and individuals become involved in offering palliative care. The toolkit will include stories, tips, definitions and further resources.

- Conscience protection: In June the Ontario Divisional Court heard the legal challenge to policies that compel doctors to refer patients for assisted suicide, even if it goes against their deeply-held beliefs. The EFC argued for freedom of conscience with co-interveners the Christian Legal Fellowship and the Assembly of Catholic Bishops of Ontario. For updates see www.TheEFC.ca/Conscience.
- Famine appeal: The EFC joined with other faith leaders to ask communities to mobilize in response to the famine crisis in four African countries. Learn more at www.TheEFC.ca/Famine2017.
- Bill C-51: A federal bill to clean up outdated criminal laws would remove the law that currently makes it illegal to interfere with clergy and wilfully disrupt religious gatherings. Bill C-51 will be reviewed by the justice committee this fall when Parliament resumes. The EFC will raise concerns about this section in Bill C-51 with MPs and the committee this fall. We are also preparing resources to inform and equip Canadians to respond.

## Canadians are battling pornography with new resource

We have heard from Navy chaplains, church pastors, organizations that serve and counsel families, denominations, youth leaders and pregnancy support service organizations.


